#### Dear Alumnae.

It is always hard to know where to start with the news from a camp summer. As I am sure you can all remember, every day at camp feels like a week and so much is packed into the summer that it often feels like you have lived a lifetime during those long lazy days.

Despite the rain in Maine (or was it a short monsoon season?) we had a spectacular summer and welcomed campers from all over the world to our little piece of Great Pond to develop friendships, community, and, of course, life-long skills. Our



diversity among staff and campers continues to expand in many ways and we are so grateful for the work of the CRAO DAC committee that keeps us on track to make sure all campers have a successful camp experience. We had 85 staff from so many countries - three continents! Our most popular activities were riding, water ski, sailing, and target sports. We added Tae Kwon Do and expanded our farm and garden program. Drama was also popular, putting on rousing productions of Alice in Wonderland and The Odyssey. We hosted three sessions of HLC (Harmony Land Camp), our "try-it" program for our youngest campers.

Campers continue to thrive in our unplugged camp environment. We added a social worker position to our team to help those who need a little extra support and to make sure we are doing our best to provide optimum mental health support alongside our physical health team.

The 2023 facility upgrades included the addition of the "Berry Patch" - three cabins near The Cottage. Each cabin has its own pix. The boathouse deck- thanks to Tim- is updated with new bench seating, Tim also created cabin porch storage, new steps on the Dining Hall, expansion of the camp gardens and lots of great maintenance carpentry around camp.

We are already filling cabins with returning and new campers, and we are recruiting staff for 2024. The families who toured camp got first in line to sign up for this summer. As always, we are using the off-season to prepare for the coming summer- making smart choices about facilities, program, and staffing that will make 2024 our best summer yet!

We are incredibly grateful to the CRAO for allowing us the opportunity to make camp available to as many campers as possible. Bobos to all of you!

#### **CHANGING LIVES THROUGH CAMPERSHIPS**

As Betsy and Marie-Claude said elsewhere in this Newsletter, the Camp Runoia Alumnae Organization (CRAO) aims to provide "camperships" that make it possible for campers to experience Runoia, even when their families' circumstances might not otherwise be able to afford it. 2024 will mark the 25th year that the CRAO has been providing this support for campers. As we approach this significant milestone, we are reminded of the inspiring story behind the Campership Fund and the impact it has had, which not everyone knows. So, please give me a minute and read on...

The CRAO Campership is formally known as **The Betty Cobb Memorial Campership Fund**, named for long-time director Betty Cobb – mother of Pam Cobb Heuberger, the immediate past Director of Runoia. The Campership Fund was seeded in 1999 with an endowment gift of \$230,000 from Betty and her husband, Phil, when they sold a piece of property the Runoia Cove, just beyond Fairy Ring.

Since that time, through the CRAO's ongoing fundraising and prudent management of the endowment, the fund has more than quadrupled in size. The CRAO follows a strict spending policy that allows finite draws on endowment returns, while continuing fundraising and reinvestment in the principal of the endowment. At its Annual Meeting each summer, the CRAO hears from Runoia's leadership about the level of financial need among its campers, assesses the financial status of the endowment, and votes on an allocation.

Last summer the CRAO's contribution provided grants of varying amounts to 21 campers. Those grants, totaling more than \$80,000, were made possible by returns from the endowment combined with outright contributions from alumnae and parents





who recognize the life-changing experience of Camp Runoia, and want to provide that for campers and their families who seek it. Over the past 2+ decades, the CRAO has contributed more than \$600,000 which has gone **entirely** to Camperships (no administrative fees), supporting dozens of campers. Canyonlands is committed to maintaining that promise of stewardship to the CRAO and the alumnae, parents and friends who have

contributed so generously. In addition to CRAO's contribution to Runoia campers, Canyonlands and its camps provided over \$250,000 in camperships in 2024 at four other camps.

Looking ahead, the CRAO aspires to at least maintain – and hopefully grow – the level of support we give to Runoia every summer for Camperships, and our ability to do that depends on the continued willing generosity of donors. As you make your annual contributions, we hope you will consider including **The Betty Cobb Memorial** 

**Campership Fund** as a priority in your philanthropy. And, consider this: gifts to the CRAO in honor of your loved ones make great holiday gifts!






### **Tidbits from CRAO and Runoia**
